

Item number: 16052**Stele of La Mojarra**

Stele with calendrical inscriptions in the Long Count system, corresponding to May 21, 143 AD and 13 July 156 AD, according to the correlation Goodman-Martinez-Thompson. Presents the full figure of a character in low relief richly dressed and displays a text with 577 full-figure glyphs in 21 columns. This is the stele with more hieroglyphics discovered so far. The sculptural style is associated with the stele "C" of Tres Zapotes, "2" of Chiapa de Corzo and the statue of the Tuxtlas, considered late manifestations of Olmec sculptural art. Found on the banks of the river Acula, the authenticity of incised inscriptions is still debated by specialists.
